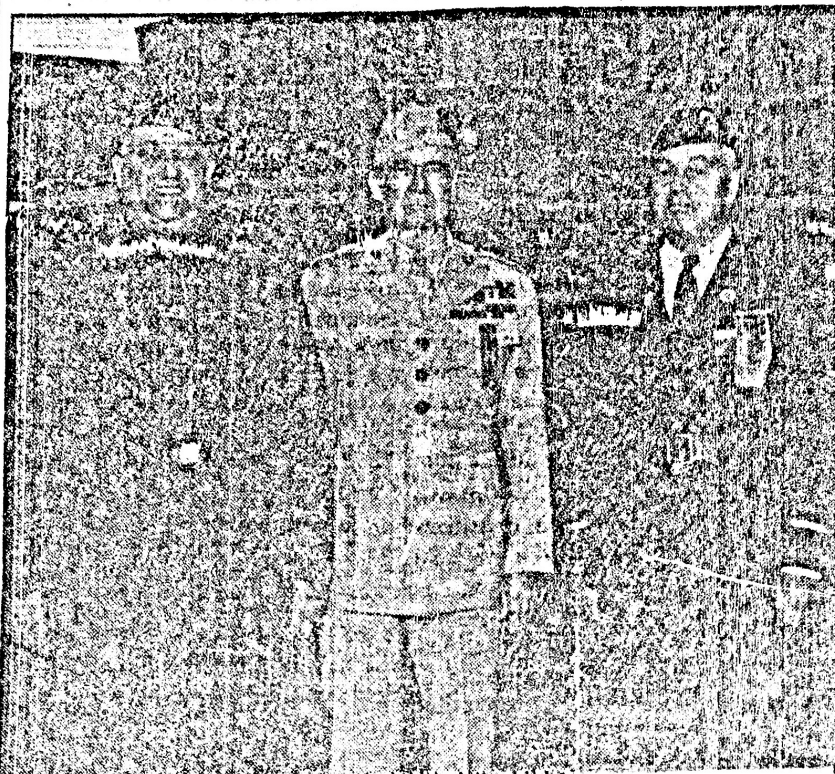

### New York Music Strike Settled

#### Wage Increase, Other Contract Changes Granted Hotel, Nite Club Musicians

New York, N. Y. — New York hotels that have been bandless for sixteen days because of a strike of musicians, are now providing music again for their patrons through the intercession of Mayor William O'Dwyer. Edward C. Maguire, the Mayor's labor adviser, said all picket lines were withdrawn, following a recent meeting at City Hall between hotel and union leaders, where the hotel men agreed to pay a 20 per cent wage increase.

A musicians' strike in the night clubs was averted previously when owners of these night spots acceded to union demands for a 20 per cent wage increase and other contract changes.

Cincinnati, O. — Two burglaries of the Brotherhood Cafe, 1138 Gest St. within 24 hours were solved by police.

### Century-Old Moreland Hills Stage Coach Inn Is Modernized And Sold As Residence

Cleveland, O. — W. L. Perkins, publisher of the Fleet Owner, publication of the trucking industry, has recently purchased the newly remodeled and modernized Old Stage Coach Inn in Moreland Hills Village on Route 422.

The century old Tavern, considered one of the finest examples of early Western Reserve architecture, was built by Christopher Jackson, pioneer settler in 1840. For more than half a century the inn was popular as an overnight stopping place for stage coach travelers en route between Cleveland, Warren, and Youngstown.

With the coming of more modern transportation the Tavern served for various periods as a country schoolhouse and as a private dwelling until its purchase 25 years ago by the Van Sweringen Co.

Modernization of the property under supervision of Ronald Spahn of Spahn & Barnes, Cleveland arch-

itects, was accomplished without sacrificing any of the rustic beauty of the structure's original architectural lines. The woodshed in the rear has been remodeled to provide laundry facilities.

The first floor of the new residence contains a large living room with fireplace, dining room, electric kitchen, breakfast room, tile lavatory, front hall and library finished in knotty pine, utility room and maid's room and bath. A master bedroom with fireplace and two smaller bedrooms are on the second floor. The house is situated on a four and a half acre parcel.

Located on North Strawberry Lane, off Chagrin Boulevard, just east of SOM Center Road, the property is part of a 142-acre tract acquired two years ago by the Moreland Hills Co. for its Fox Hollow home development.
